Emergency Preparedness Team

The Emergency Preparedness Team has been collecting donations to create 7 First Aid Bags to position around the building. In addition, we would like to create two enhanced first aid kits for the main floor bathrooms. We were also advised during our CPR, AED, and First Aid Training on May 1 that we need to have an additional set of AED pads and a sign for the device itself. We created an updated first aid kit supply list that also includes signage for places to shelter during severe storms and in case of a tornado.

We have collected \$600 of the \$1127 needed, and some of the supplies have been ordered. If you would like to contribute to the first aid and emergency supplies, please speak to a member of the EP Team (Amy, Brand and Jack). A printed list of the remaining items that are needed has been posted on the bulletin board in the foyer, and Amy can forward the Amazon wish list upon request.

The Board of Trustees meets at 1:00 on the third Sunday of each month. Every member of the church is invited to attend and speak. We keep the minutes of board meetings in the Board Book in the Carolyn Cameron room. They are always available for inspection.

Last month:

The Board mostly focused on the Spring Congregational Meeting itself and preparing the minutes afterward.

I was reelected as President of the Board, Carole was reelected as Treasurer, and Susie was elected to finish the one year left in the Vice President's term.

We discussed our congregational goals, which were:

- Expand our visibility,
- Seek a pianist,
- Engage more speakers,
- Continue to seek a minister,
- Committees will plan for succession.

As promised, we are working on creating SMART-Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, and Time-bound—parameters for each goal.

We are finishing up our 501(c)(3) application, which is now under review by our legal counsel, and the review of the Bylaws and Policies & Procedures Manual is underway.

Red River UU Social Justice Team Gears Up

A small group met on Sunday, May 24, for our regular fourth Sunday meeting. Most of the discussion focused on the upcoming Juneteenth event in Denison Saturday June 20 and our participation in UU the Vote. Michael Lagocki facilitated the meeting.

We will host and coordinate the church booth at the Denison Juneteenth festival. Brand and Amy will be there to set up, and we welcome additional volunteers. Jan has posted a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board in the foyer. Voter registration will be available at the booth throughout the day, and Kurt Cichowski has offered to help. We also need additional booth signs, including "Register to Vote," "Vote Your Values," and "Do you need a ride to the polls?" In addition, we need sign-up sheets to collect contact information from interested visitors. Please consider volunteering to help increase Red River Unitarian-Universalist visibility in the community.



UU the Vote is a Side with Love initiative that has helped drive record-breaking voter turnout across three election cycles. The threats to justice and democracy

cannot be addressed at the ballot box alone; they also call us to care for our neighbors and affirm human dignity.

The Social Action Team has requested the 5th Sunday service slot on August 30. The service will include song, a 10-minute talk, and a postcard-writing activity. . To prepare, we need postcard topics, addresses, stamps, and a brief script with a clear, compelling message.

By August, Amy will outline three pillars of a Get Out the Vote campaign:

1. Voter registration. Amy and Jan are voter registrars. We should encourage more members of the congregation to become registrars so we can expand opportunities to register voters. We also plan to add

signage to the Little Free Library about voter registration at the church.

2. Voting our values. This includes crafting messages for block walking, phone banking, and texting voters. Amy will clarify the difference between the MiniVAN and Texas Connect apps before the our June 28 meeting.

3. Getting people to the polls. This includes providing rides, encouraging group voting to reduce insecurity and discourage voter intimidation, and coordinating observers outside polling places to report intimidation.

The last discussion centered on ways to support growth of the Social Justice Team. We should focus on storytelling through photos and history and create fun, easy, and low-risk ways for people to get involved in social action. Photos taken during meetings can also be used in our monthly newsletter articles.

Brand shared a zine he recently picked up, which led to a discussion about creating our own zine on voting our conscience. Michael offered to help with illustrations, and the content still needs to be developed.

The annual NAACP Scholarship Banquet will be held on Saturday, August 8, at Austin College. Each year, NAACP and Sherman Interdenominational Alliance co-host this special event to recognize and support graduating high school seniors from across Grayson County.

Did you know that our church has been a life member of the local NAACP chapter for many years? We reserved and paid for a table for eight. Money Matter\$

For the fiscal year-to-date period of July 1 through April 30, we had an operating profit of \$7,660.05. This was primarily due to lower expenses on most line items and higher donations than budgeted, partially offset by unbudgeted expenses for yard work. I expect that this profit will reduce over the next two months.

As of April 30, 2026, we had \$23,074.39 available to be used for general operations in our bank checking account, \$9,970.45 available in our bank savings account, and approximately \$24,141.69 available in our UUA savings fund. The amount available in the UUA savings fund varies based on market value. In addition, we have the following restricted amounts: \$4,871.08 in our bank savings account restricted for the Minister Fund; \$5,951.89 in our bank savings account held in trust for Kat Walston; \$622.00 in our bank checking account for share the plate; \$16,556.99 in the endowment fund; and \$51,000.00 restricted in the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation.

In addition to the results from operations, we have spent \$3,628.30 year-to-date from restricted funds leaving \$17,562.63 restricted to cover continuing repairs and renovations to the building and to increase visibility in the community to grow membership.
