# A Personal Reflection By Marla Loturco

(Member since April 2008)

I share this out of deep love and concern for our congregation:

If Red River Unitarian Universalist Church does not find more volunteers to help sustain our work, our church will not survive in the long run.

This may not be a popular opinion, but it comes from experience and care. I believe it's something we all need to hear and consider honestly.

Here are some realities that many small congregations, including ours, face:

- 1. Churches that are not growing are in decline.
- 2. Congregations composed primarily of members over 70 are often in decline.
- 3. Churches without ministers and with worship teams lacking depth struggle to sustain vitality.
- 4. When leadership roles go unfilled (for example, Vice President), the church is in decline.
- 5. When members and friends do not consider regular Sunday attendance important, decline sets in.
- 6. Small churches where fewer than 70% of adults participate in service or leadership roles are in decline.
- 7. When communication breaks down—when newsletters and updates don't flow between teams, decline follows.
- 8. When social time or food becomes more central than shared spiritual reflection, there's a problem.

These are warning signs, and we're seeing several of them now.

I was deeply disappointed by the small turnout at our most recent Congregational Meeting. As a lay-led congregation, and as part of a denomination grounded in congregational polity, the health of our church depends on the participation and engagement of its members. When only a few people show up, we lose the balanced, collective wisdom that makes us strong.

I share this not to criticize, but to call us back to commitment—to one another, to our shared values, and to the beloved community we have built together. With care and concern,

## Help Wanted NEEDED

Our butterfly gardens need TLC. We are

having a Work in the Garden Day this Saturday, November 8<sup>th</sup> beginning at 10:00 am. (Rain date 10/15.) The beds are in bad shape. They need to be put to bed for the winter with help for their root systems so they can grow strong this winter and burst forth in the spring. We need to dig in some compost, Azomite (trace minerals), bone meal, and dried molasses, then mulch them with cardboard and wood chips. I am supplying mulch and amendments. Bring cardboard to go under the mulch to suppress weed seeds. Even if you can't stay, please drop corrugated cardboard off. Some financial help would be appreciated, too. ### **Money Matters**

For the fiscal year-to-date period of July 1 through September 30, we had an operating net profit of \$9,420.40. This was due to the timing of pledge donations, partially offset by expenses for yardwork.

We continue to expect to have a loss this fiscal year due to lower pledges and additional expenses for yard work.

As of September 30, 2025, we had \$25,294.71 available to be used for general operations in our bank checking account, \$9,952.35 available in our bank savings account, and approximately \$22,307.49 available in our UUA savings fund. The amount available in the UUA savings fund varies based on market value. In addition, we have the following restricted amounts: \$4,871.08 in our bank savings account restricted for the Minister Fund; \$5,951.89 in our bank savings account held in trust for Kat Walston; \$318.00 in our bank checking account for share the plate; \$16,152.83 in the endowment fund; \$51,000.00 restricted in the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation; and \$21,053.06 restricted to cover continuing repairs and renovations to the building and to increase visibility in the community in order to grow membership.
