From the Prez...

2025 was a rollercoaster year here at Red River UU Church. We began with a proposed budget cut to the bone. Then our pledges didn't meet that, and we had to dip into savings to meet our operating costs. I was truly afraid that we were a couple of years away from closing our doors.

Then as we moved into summer, I started noticing synchronicities. Someone would say they wanted to work on X to meet one of our needs, and someone else would respond that they had been thinking about that, too, and were figuring out Y. That kept happening. There was a palpable shift in energy.

We had 14 people formally join our congregation! A few were long-term visitors who suddenly felt called to deepen their relationship. The rest were new to us, and many were new to Unitarian Universalism. They bring a wide range of talents, a lot of enthusiasm, and their beautiful and kind selves to make us better than ever.

The Board has caught up on a lot of a-church-is-also-a-business-entity work: the boring but necessary things that keep us going. We have always been under the UUA's 501(c)(3) umbrella, but we are creating our own so that we can qualify for grants.

We have some cleaning up of the Bylaws and the Policies and Procedures Manual to do, and it's time to start creating our new budget and getting ready for the stewardship campaign. Save us from the terror that we won't meet our budget: pledge early and often

Susie Norris, who has done a remarkable job chairing the Membership Committee, has offered to take on even more work by serving as our Vice President.

Susie and Walter have also proposed that we give the artists among us a chance to share their creativity with us. We will host our first Art Exhibit in March.Pat Bley has accepted the newly created position of Community Outreach Director and will help us become more visible by participating in events in Denison, Sherman, and Durant. We have a lot of work to do in 2026, and most of it is going to be a lot of fun. I can't wait.

Treasurer'\$ Report

Treasurer Report as of November 30, 2025. For the fiscal year-to-date period of July 1 through November 30, we had an operating net profit of \$7,239.19. This was due to the timing of pledge donations and to lower expenses in several categories, partially offset by unbudgeted expenses for yard work. We continue to expect to have a loss this fiscal year due to lower pledges and additional expenses for yard work. As of October 31, 2025, we had \$22,642.92 available to be used for general operations in our bank checking account, \$9,957.39 available in our bank savings account, and approximately \$23,967.06 available in our UUA savings fund. The amount available in the UUA savings fund varies based on market value. In addition, we have the following restricted amounts: \$4,871.08 in our bank savings account restricted for the Minister Fund; \$5,951.89 in our bank savings account held in trust for Kat Walston; \$645.67 in our bank checking account for share the plate; \$16,518.51 in the endowment fund; and \$51,000.00 restricted in the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation. In addition to the results from operations, we have spent \$1,407.49 year-to-date leaving \$19,783.44 restricted to cover continuing repairs and renovations to the building and to increase visibility in the community in order to grow membership.

Our New Website, an Update

Our new website has been live since Dec 8th, and during that time we've been actively working to improve our SEO (search engine optimization—the system Google and Bing use to rank search results).

When we first checked Google, our church appeared on page 2 for these searches:

- Liberal churches near me
- LGBTQ friendly churches near me
- LGBTQ welcoming churches near me

As of December 18th, those same searches show real progress:

- **Liberal churches near me** 17 on page 1 (20 results per page)
- LGBTQ friendly churches near me #11 on page 1
- LGBTQ welcoming churches near me #6 on page 1

These results vary during the time of day, by device, and by browser I use. However, we're clearly moving in the right direction.

So why are some other churches still ranking ahead of us? One major reason is **Google reviews**. I checked several Baptist and Trinity churches that appear before us, and many of them have **40 or more reviews within the past year**.

Until recently, we had only six reviews dating back to 2023. Marla, Kacci/Lady, and I each added a review, bringing us to nine—and even with just those three latest reviews, we've already seen our search rankings improve.

This is where you can help.

We're asking each of you to post a Google review for Red River Unitarian Universalist Church.

How to leave a Google review:

- 1. Go to Google and search "Red River Unitarian Universalists."
- 2. Our church information should appear on the right side of the screen.
- 3. Under our name, you'll see **Google Reviews** with star ratings—click there.
- 4. Click the "**Write a review**" button and share your experience.

When writing your review, please try to include keywords such as **liberal**, **friendly**, **welcoming**, **progressive**, **and LGBTQ**. You're welcome to read Marla's or Kacci/Lady's, or my review for inspiration, but please use your own words.

Thank you for helping us become more visible to people searching for a welcoming, inclusive spiritual community.

Also - looking for Our Governance and other pages that are missing? In the utility menu (upper right of a web page) you will see a menu item "Members". We moved them under that

menu item. Our future plans are to turn this into a members logon area.

Emal the web team if you see any issues or have any suggestions for improving the website.
