# Sunday, April 29<sup>th</sup> ~ FLOWER COMMUNION SUNDAY

#### "Why Do We Paint The Roses Red?"

The Rev. Nate Walker, video sermon

Norbert Čapek, who was also the founder of the Unitarian Church in Czechoslovakia. He saw the need to unite the diverse congregants of his church, from varying Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish grounds, without alienating those who had left these traditions. For this reason he rejected the Eucharist. The Flower Communion instead borrows from the universal beauty of nature. The first Flower Communion was held in Prague on June 4, 1923. Čapek's term is more accurately translated as "Flower Celebration," a term which continues to be preferred by Czech Unitarians today.

Bring a flower with you to church as we celebrate the 89<sup>th</sup> Flower Communion service. We will watch A Flower Communion sermon where Reverend Nate, minister of the First Unitarian Church of Philadelphia draw upon Lewis Carroll's "Alice in Wonderland" to ask, "why do we paint the roses red?"



### Manna from Maria

This month I want to give you an overview from the Town Hall Meeting held in the chapel after things on Sunday, March 25th. The topic was **Social Justice – Where Do We Go From Here?** Many good ideas were presented and several people have done research in our local area to check out the possibilities.

We listened to a detailed report written by George Gravley on his meetings with Denison City Council member and the Shalom movement in North town (the neighborhood our church is in). George could not be with us for the meeting because he was visiting his new grandson in Washington D.C.

He found that **Shalom**, an association of seven area churches, provides tutoring to local youth; summer Vacation Bible school programs; beginning computer classes; a back to school festival in August; and a variety of other programs. We could:

- participate in current programs
- help start Spanish / English language classes
- raise money for future use through a joint Garage Sale
- assist in attracting more tutoring participants
- Participate in other ways

We would need to have a Shalom Coordinator.

Marion Hill and Carolyn Cameron

reported on their meeting with Ashley Earls at the **Denison Shelter**. Some ways we might help them could include

- Allow the shelter to hold their board meetings at our church. – this is currently being arranged.
- Cook an occasional meal for the residents
- Have an "open porch", inviting the women and children from the shelter over to play on the church grounds and enjoy cookies, coffee & juice.
- Assist with craft evenings and/or life skills classes
- Instead of RRUU giving out money at the church for local individuals who need help, the Shelter is already set up to handle this and also food. We could give our 2nd Sunday collections to the shelter and then send people from the neighborhood there for help
- The shelter always needs personal items like toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, shampoo.
- Assist with the food bank at the shelter
- Explore other possibilities

Jim Murphy has looked into the **Summer Reading Program** and the Denison Library – they could have used help to coordinate the program – they might be able to use volunteers for the summer.

A suggestion was made by Carole Harner that we might want to begin having one Sunday a month where we have a service project instead of a worship service.

Several speakers voiced the feeling that RRUU should focus its social-justice efforts on making an impact in our local community. There is an organization forming in Texas of UU Churches who

would like to have an impact on Texas legislation. If anyone is interested in this organization, private individuals may join for \$25.00 and the church for \$2.00 per member reported to the UUA. Please ask me about it. The UU congregations in Arizona have had similar legislative watch projects for some years.

Where do we go from here? We need to know what support exists within the congregation before we commit RRUU's resources and people. There is nothing worse than being all fired up with no follow through. The board is preparing a brief feedback survey of potential ways we can do social justice work to change and grow at RRUU. Everyone is invited and encouraged to look for and complete the survey (sent on line). What issues would you personally support - not only financially, but with gifts of time as well. Watch for it coming soon. If you couldn't attend the meeting, you can email me with your ideas, concerns and suggestions about where we can go from here. Thanks.

The Forum will continue exploring the world through the works of Friedrich Nietzsche for the first part of April.

Then, come explore the history of Unitarianism. A new film series *The Strange Trip* takes us on a sojourn through history - our history! These three videos are part of the new UU History Series.

Because each film is 60 minutes, we will start promptly at 9:45 each week.

- April 15, 9:45 am ~ Part I examines the early roots of liberal religious thought, concluding with the life and work of Michael Servetus (sometimes called the "first Unitarian").
- April 22, 9:45 am ~ Part II focuses on the spread of Servetus' message through countries in Europe and concludes with the emigration of Joseph Priestley from England to American.
- April 29, 9:45 am ~ Part III portrays the development of Unitarianism in America through the death of Theodore Parker in 1860, including the Transcendalist movement led by Ralph Waldo Emerson and Margaret Fuller.

### **Financial Update** ~the treasurer's report

" Good News continues for RRUU renovation Funding!"

Good news continues for RRUU renovation funding. A \$2,500 donation was very recently received, and \$200 was raised from the bookmarks created by several women of the congregation. The current budget projected that \$10,500 would be given to RRUU in cash donations.

In fact, the total stands at \$24,900! Combined with the \$50,000 loan from the congregation, \$74,900 was raised for the renovation of our "new" building.

At the end of March \$67,968.62 had been spent, which leaves a remainder of \$6,931.38. Of that funding, \$200.00 is earmarked for chapel improvements and \$500.00, for installation of the donated chair lift.

Several gifts-in-kind have also recently been received. They include a la-

pel microphone, dinnerware, a folding table and seven tablecloths. In addition, a six part series of films was donated. Titled, Long Strange Trip, the series details "the history of Unitarian and Universalist thought from the beginning of the Christian era to what we know today as Unitarian Universalism."


Net income for March was -\$1,496.92. This looks worse than it really is. The budget projected a net income of -\$49,900, or over -\$4,000 per month. The large renovation cash donations, the sale of
