Sunday, June 3rd

"More Things in Heaven and Earth: God, Shakespeare, and the Invention of the Human"

The Rev Dr. Christine Tata, preaching Carole Harner, worship associate

In a contest of creativity, who would win -- God or Shakespeare? Don't answer too quickly -- at least one scholar has credited William Shakespeare with the actual invention of humans as we know them. But did Shakespeare create a religious human? And if so, what kind of religion would Shakespeare's creation follow? The evidence is scarce but provocative. Against a backdrop of some of the finest poetry ever written, from both God and Shakespeare, Dr. Christine Tata attempts to illuminate the soul of the human being Shakespeare wrote into existence -- and perhaps shed light on our own souls' manuscripts, too.

"Five Hundred Years of Injustice"

It was called the Doctrine of Christian Discovery. Pope Nicholas V issued the papal bull Dum Diversas on 18 June, 1452. It authorized Alfonso V of Portugal to invade, search out, capture, vanquish, and subdue all Saracens (Muslims) and pagans whatsoever, and other enemies of Christ wheresoever placed and their kingdoms, possessions, and all movable and immovable goods whatsoever held and possessed by them and to reduce their persons to perpetual slavery and to convert them to his and their use and profit.

The Doctrine of Discovery has had profoundly negative impacts on Indigenous Peoples for the last 500+ years. Governments and various organizations have used the Doctrine of Discovery to justify the taking lands, the extermination of people and cultures, and the breaking of agreements and treaties

Next week at the UU General Assembly a vote will be taken for us to join The World Council of

churches, the Episcopal Church and the United Nations in fighting to repudiate the Doctrine of Christian Discovery.

The History of Written Language

As with most human endeavors, our ability to preserve our thoughts by inscribing them in some way is generally handed down from generation to generation. Writing, as we know it, varies from culture to culture and frequently involves an evolution of symbols that mimics changes in vocabulary and our understanding of the spoken language.

Most people have not given any thought to how or where written language began or how it has evolved over the millennia. This presentation will summarize some of the more important places, times and development of the process and evolution of writing. It will correlate a relationship between mankind and his population spread during and following the Pleistocene Epoch (Ice Age).

Gil Alexander is a geologist by training and received B.S. and M.S. degrees from East Texas State University with majors in Pre-law and Earth Science and studied for his Ph.D in geology at the University of Montana. I want to tell you what happened at the Spring Congregation Meeting held on May 20th. The roll call taken, we had 20 people present (or with us via proxy).

Here's our new church leadership: Elbert Hill is the newly elected president of Red River Unitarian Universalist Church. He and his Vice President, Carla Murphy, Treasurer, Carole Harner will be taking office on July 1, 2012. Joyce Peak is the newly elected member of the Committee on Ministry. Doug Strong and Faye Shadrick were elected along with myself for the Nominations Committee.

Financially we aren't in as good a shape as we would like to be. After a lively discussion, the congregation voted to accept an unbalanced budget— and the board will continue to work at attempting to balance it. We are still \$4,382 short in accomplishing that. We also spoke about what we want to accomplish for 2012-2013. Here are the approved goals:

- 1. Participation of members & friends
 - attendance to average 34 by December 1, 2012
 - attendance to average 39 by June 2013
- Support financial fundraisers & pledges

- Two new fundraisers to collect money outside our church family by June 2013
- 3. Communication needs of the congregation communicated to board & committees.
- 4. Growth 5 net new members and 5 net new friends by June 2013
- 5. Increase number of small chalice circles / interest groups by 4.
- 6. Increase the number of groups using our building by 3 of social justice or revenue producing nature.
- 7. Find 3 ways to participate in broader outreach in the community.
- 8 Establish info structure to support our membership drive



Share The Plate ~Sunday, June 10th

This month all cash contributions on June 10th, our regular "Share The Plate" Sunday will go to Camp Sweeny, a special camp for diabetic kids. Located in Whitesboro, it is a 3-week residential camp and teaches kids how to manage and cope with diabetic life skills. The camp is now in its 67th year.

When a child is diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes, his or her life is changed forever. Insulin injections, pump site changes, blood-sugar tests, and a diet plan become a part of the daily routine for a child with diabetes. Unfortunately, while many children know what is necessary to stay in good control of their condition, they find it hard to live the kind of regimented lifestyle which will allow them to live long and healthy lives. At Camp Sweeney, we believe that simply teaching children about diabetes is just not enough. Our goal is that every child who attends our camp will not only learn about his or her condition, but will find the inner strength each day to do what it takes to live a healthy lifestyle.

Financial Update ~the treasurer's report

RRUU's beautiful spring landscaping was totally funded by a generous donation to the renovation fund.

Cash contributions for 515 N. Burnett improvements this fiscal year were expected to total \$10,500. This figured has grown to \$26,100, and grateful thanks go out to all donors. Combined with the \$50,000 loan from the congregation, \$76,100 was raised for the church renovation. A little over \$3,100 remains in the fund.

Cash flow for May was excellent because one pledging unit paid a full year's commitment. This led to a net income of approximately \$680.00. Utilities remain below budget as does childcare, worship and administration spending. At the end of May, CD's and savings totaled \$37,472.85. The checkbook balance was \$907.68.

May's Share-the-Plate recipient was the Texas Lions Camp which received \$65.00. It is a camp open to children with disabilities at no charge and is supported by Lions Clubs throughout the state of Texas.
