**This morning** we offer a special invitation to virtually participate in a UU tradition has spans generations. Each summer at the UU General Assembly those gathere join in a worship celebration of ministry called the Service of the

Living Tradition where newly fellowshipped ministers receive their credentials; retiring ministers are appreciated; and ministers who've died over the last year (May 2019-May 2020) are honored. This year's Service of the Living Tradition was held virtually on Sunday, June 24, 2020.

Our preacher this year is The Rev. Danielle Di Bona. She has served Unitarian Universalism for 30 years and is the 2018 recipient of the Award for Distinguished Service to the Cause of Unitarian Universalism. She is the 2004 recipient of the Melvin Hoover "Beloved Community Award" for outstanding service to Communities of Color in Unitarian Universalism.

She has served as a member of the UU Nominating Committee and on the UU Women's Federation board. She is the former President and Vice President of the Diverse and Revolutionary Unitarian Universalist Multicultural Ministries and continues to serve DRUUMM as Chaplain.

In her retirement she serves as the Palliative Care chaplain at South Shore Hospital in Waymouth, MA. Danielle identifies as bi-racial. Her father was born in Italy and came to the US when he was seven. Her mother was Wampanoag, a tribe that has lived on the south shore of Massachusetts for thousands of years.
