Commission Prepares to Revise UUA's Principles and Sources (you know, the We affirm and promote ... the 7 ideals framed on the wall in the Alexander Room and are Article II of the UUA bylaws.)

Article II Study Commission is in conversation about our values and purposes as an organization and as a faith community and will present a draft of a new statement for the 2022 General Assembly.

A study commission has begun work to revise Article II of the UUA Bylaws. Article II currently includes the Principles, Sources, and Purposes of the UUA, along with a Statement of Inclusion and a Statement of Freedom of Belief. It expresses the covenant that our congregations make to each other as part of the UUA.

Article II was <u>last revised in 1985</u>, with amendments approved in 1995 and <u>2018</u>. A <u>proposed revision narrowly failed in 2009</u>.

The study commission is engaging groups and individuals in conversation about our values and purposes as an organization and as a faith community and will be hosting workshops and conversations at the 2021 General Assembly. A draft of the new statement will be presented to the 2022 General Assembly.

The commission is chaired by Becky Brooks and the Rev. Cheryl M. Walker. Other members are Paula Cole Jones, Satya Mamdani, Rob Spirko, and Maya Waller. Learn more about the commission and its work.

Bearable Together by Elizabeth Stevens

September 1, 2021

"Are you sitting down?" These were not words I wanted to hear at the end of a day spent sheltering in place due to an active shooter situation in my small town—the second in ten years. But I sat down, took a deep breath, and began my journey alongside the friends and family of one of the victims, alongside a congregation and a community that had experienced a terrifying, confusing, inexplicable loss. I also began a journey through my own trauma and grief.

Traumatic experiences, by definition, make us feel overwhelmed, out of control, disconnected, and uncomprehending. Pain and grief are not pleasant feelings, either. I'm often tempted to travel as fast as I can through these uncomfortable places, but trauma defies my attempts to rush.

In the weeks and months following the shooting, I stayed in the midst of the pain by letting go of my need for control and tolerating the feelings of powerlessness. Healing wasn't an intellectual process, but an embodied unfolding. I gave myself the space to be baffled and brokenhearted, to lament. I held space for other confused and grieving people, bearing witness to one another in love and celebrating the miraculous ways that together, we discovered a deeper resilience and a greater wisdom.

Five years later, I got another "are you sitting down?" call. This one came when I was a continent away, supporting my mother after my stepfather's death. "Do you need me to come home?" I asked.

"No," said the voice on the other end of the line, a member of our lay pastoral ministry team. "You taught us how to do this. We'll sit and stay and hold the space until you get back."

<u>Ingathering in Complicated Times</u> by <u>Susan Frederick-Grey</u>

August 31, 2021

We have all worked extremely hard during the pandemic to keep our families, congregations, and communities safe, while longing for the time when the pandemic is behind us. Unfortunately, vaccine hesitancy, breakthrough cases in vaccinated individuals and the alarming contagiousness of the COVID-19 Delta variant (even among the vaccinated) call for re-evaluation of many of our plans.

The way forward will be different across communities. Rates of vaccination, the ability to meet outside. quality ventilation, physical space, congregation size and the particular needs and risks of our staff and leaders—these all vary and are vital factors in our planning. We urge leaders to be guided by the latest information from the CDC and trusted local public health departments in planning how your congregations can worship safely. We have also issued Updated Guidance for the Delta Variant in response to the Delta surge, including six specific recommendations for congregations.

The Delta variant setback has many of us, especially leaders, feeling frustrated, heartbroken, and exhausted. We are not where we hoped to be. As vaccine inequity and disparity continues, with only 15% of people across the globe vaccinated, we are all coming to terms with the reality that the pandemic will be with us in various forms for some time.

While we are not able to share Ingathering services as we have in the past, nor in the ways we may have planned, these rituals are still needed. Ingathering, regardless of the form it takes, celebrates the ways we are held by a wider circle of love and care.

I invite you to share this Ingathering message from me with your congregations or as part of your Ingather-

Treasurer's Report

We have started the new fiscal year with very positive results. In the month of July, we had total receipts of \$17,016.96, which included the NTUCC grant of \$7,200.00, and pledges of \$8,000.00. Expenses for the month totaled \$2,758.62, leaving net income for the month of July of \$14,258.41.

During the month, we used some of that cash to purchase \$2,941.69 of new AV equipment. More will be purchased in the coming months.

As of July 31, 2021, we had \$12,521.50 available in checking, a total of \$19,090.31 in all savings accounts and a total of \$80,281.13 in UUCEF funds.

We begin the year in a very solid financial position.
