Our Common Read for World Kindness Day, Nov. 13<sup>th</sup> By Don Mathis

At its worst, pain is a nuisance; it's an annoying bother. Or maybe that's the best pain can be. Perhaps, at its worst, pain is a depressing numbness or a debilitating injury. It is dull or sharp, numbered one through ten, temporary or lethal.

But pain is an experience, and often a learning experience. If you burn your hand, you learn to respect fire. If you sit on a tack, you will move to avoid sharp objects.

The more serious types of physical or chronic pain can teach us compassion. Thus, we can offer hope and help to those in pain. If we have been emotionally or psychologically hurt, we can offer advice, we can offer a listening ear. With compassion, we can offer a shoulder to lean on, a helping hand, or a pat on the back.

If we learn nothing from pain, it is a lesson wasted. Pain can help us learn the Golden Rule – "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Luke recorded as much in the New Testament.

On October 17th we held our fall meeting. It was a hybrid meeting with members live in the Chapel and members live but remote on Zoom. A big thank you to all that attended and to the AV team for making this hybrid meeting a success. Another first for the AV team was setting up the equipment to allow our remote Zoom users to be heard over the Chapel speakers. And while I'm in the "thank you" mood, thank you to all the teams and committees that presented their reports for the meeting.

During discussions, three items stood out.

- 1. The membership recommended that we let the Board decide when the Chapel doors should be locked during the service. For the October 24th service the board choose to not lock the doors and to continue this until further notice.
- 2. We had a lively discussion on "should we get a minister." It was decided that the Board would investigate this in more detail. If anyone has any thoughts on this that they wish the Board to consider, please contact a Board member.
- 3. It was brought up that the Chapel windows let in a lot of light which looks good for people worshipping in the Chapel but causes issues with light balancing and colors with the cameras that reduces the quality of the video for those watching on our YouTube channel. The Aesthetics Team and the AV Team will investigate options to solve this dilemma by perhaps adding spotlights focused on the pulpit and/or reducing the lighting coming through the windows.

On Saturday, November 6th, the facilities team is planning a trash clean out day. We will have a 12-yard dumpster and 6 volunteers from Austin College to make the work considerably easier. We will be removing all the unnecessary "treasures" that have been accumulating in the garages and basement and will donating usable items to the Family Shelter Thrift Store, on the curb for treasure seekers, or in the dumpster. If you have a hankering to help, show up around 9:30. We'd love to have you come.

In 2022, Texas will hold its first elections under the new maps—even though the maps and SB1 are both the subjects of multiple court challenges.
