## To Call a Minister or Not – That's the Question!

In the 2021 Fall Congregational Meeting the membership voted to have an ad hoc team look into what the steps are to get a minister by reviewing our Bylaws, UUA requirements, and the financial feasibility to cover a minister's compensation and what the process entails. The Board appointed Dick Powell, Marla Loturco, and Linda Tracy to carry out this investigation.

In our January Board meeting we met with the Investigation Team and based on what we learned we decided to call our community together to explore the question whether to call a minister or not.

In early March we will email out a packet of information to all members and friends that will contain:

- Report on the Investigation Team findings
- Recommended Bylaw changes needed whether we vote to go ahead or not
- Agenda for a Special Congregational Meeting 20, 2022

We will hold a special congregational meeting (live and Zoom) immediately following the Morning Assembly to discuss the packet of information and to vote. Our bylaws state only voting members may vote and to be a voting member one must make a contribution of record (financial or volunteer time) within the last 12 months.

Friends of the congregation who would like to vote must sign the membership book and make a contribution of record by February 20, 2022. If you've been mulling over joining the congregation, this would be a perfect time to do so. Please email <a href="membership@redriveruu.org">membership@redriveruu.org</a> for details.

We have been a lay-led congregation for nearly 25 years, and some may fear getting a minister might hamper the style of worship we've come to enjoy.

The charge from the fall congregational meeting to consider a minister was based more on considering a minister to help improve the health of our community than on changing our style of worship.

Here are five critical facts that impact our future and cause us serious concern:

- Over the last six months only 29 of our 39 members are active
- 2. Twenty are over 65 and 13 have health issues
- 3. Those over 65 contribute 73% of our pledge income
- 4. The members with health issues contribute 58% of our pledge income
- 5. There are 137 *ongoing* tasks that must be carried out and currently they are being done by 28 members and 4 friends
- 6. 12 of the individually are all doing five or more tasks

The essential teams (think Membership, Finance, Worship, Audio Visual) have members serving on multiple teams. Right now, we have several open positions that we can't fill. Continuing doing business as usual will be our downfall. We lack a critical mass of people to sustain our congregation. Frankly, it will take a larger congregation to ensure our future. We need folks who can network beyond the church to raise our visibility and attract new members. This is where a minister would greatly help.

Please attend the March 20 special congregational meeting in person or on Zoom. This is a discussion that needs to take place. It is happening just six days before our 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. We need this meeting to forge a path that will enhance the hope that Red River UU will celebrate a 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Come. Listen. Share. Learn. We each are in the congregation because we want the church to be here. The special meeting may become the most important congregational meeting we've ever had.

# Treasurer Report

December 2021 was a pretty quiet month. Total receipts were \$3,337.00, including pledges totaling \$1,680.00, and other income of \$1,100.00 for the purchase of new AV equipment. Expenses for the month totaled \$2,104.44, resulting in net income for the month of \$1,232.56. Net income for this fiscal year-to-date was \$22,998.43.

As of December 31, 2021, we had \$8,871.14 available in checking, of which \$1,469.13 remains available for additional support for Lanan Shelton. We also have a total of \$19,103.13 in all savings accounts, including \$2,545.00 in the Ronda DeCaire Memorial Fund and a total of \$81,847.52 in UUCEF funds.

Looking at our performance through December compared to our Budget, we see that total income was \$20,506.40 over budget due to receipt of an NTUUC grant of \$7,200 (which wasn't budgeted) and the receipt of \$10,400.00 of donations restricted for the purchase of new AV equipment. Operating expenses are under budget through December by \$2,769.03, leaving us with a significant positive budget variance for net income of \$23,275.43, of which \$13,478.62 has been used to purchase new AV equipment.
