Search Team Update

The Minister Search Team meets each month at 2pm in the Alexander Room on the Thursday prior to the Sunday monthly Board meeting. It is an open meeting so join us live or on Zoom with the Zoom ID 989 0789 7878.

Our August meeting was held on August 18. Our next meeting will be on Sept. 15.

The team reviewed the results of the 4 congregational meetings we held to discuss what the congregation is looking for in a new minister. We still have some members that missed the meetings so the team will be contacting them to get their feedback.

We are also asking our congregation if they would be able to make a financial commitment toward covering the minister's compensation. We are in the process of designing a pledge card that will be available soon. We already have some verbal commitments toward this funding. We will also be adding a donation category to

GiveButter so that people may make direct donations to the minister Compensation Fund.

We discussed our financial projections analysis for the cost of a minister over time. In looking at the first 2 years with a full-time contract minister our analysis is showing that we have some challenges affording them based on our income and expense assumptions. Once we receive the pledge cards and know what additional financial commitments our congregation can do, the team will be able to put together a more accurate cost projection for the contract minister.

Based on our financial assumption it still looks like we will need to pull some money out of savings to cover the additional funds needed to pay for the minister's compensation package. We will recommend to the Board that they discuss this in the Fall Congregational Meeting and let the voting members determine an amount they feel comfortable taking out of savings.

New Purchases

We have new porch

We purchased a new printer and the other tired one has been put upstairs in the church office for occasional use. Doug is using the new one for all the church communications he handles and printing the Sunday Morning Program.

We bought new carts with drawers for under the counters in the kitchen. This should make organizing the kitchen and the table linens a lot easier, will eliminate the clutter, and look nicer.

The board approved up to \$5,000 for materials and labor to repair and put new siding on the garages. We hope to get a grant to reimburse us for much of that cost, but it was necessary that the work begin now instead of waiting. One wall has shifted completely off the foundation and will need to be lifted and supported again, as well as holes in siding repaired and new siding put on. This specific Tuesday is set aside every year to register new voters or update information prior to early voting that starts in October for the November election.

Volunteer Deputy Voter Registrars will be on duty at the Church from 4 to 7 pm on that date to not only help get your voter registrations ready but also to answer any questions you may have about changes in the new Texas Voter Laws. Please be sure to stop by that afternoon.



Social Justice Ministry

Red River UU listed a blank for some years in its Social Justice Ministry while I worked for outside groups. With our hopes of a minister showing interest in social justice, my conscience finally won, and I volunteered to become our Social Justice Chair.

For those who may not know me, I have been involved with Red River UU since 2008 either musically or through Earth Day. For a short period, I even tried my hand as Treasurer. Doug has placed articles in the Newsletter about some of my political activities over the past few years.

I'm a Volunteer Deputy Voter Registrar here in Grayson County, a precinct chair for pct #305 and have taken part in the Black History Month events. I'm a member of the Historical Marker for the Sherman Riot of 1930 Committee and taken part in numerous parades. Currently, the; fourth Monday of each month I present a speaker on some side of the political process as a public service through a nonpartisan program titled CIVICS 101: How America Works.



The past 2 weeks, I've found valuable information for Social Justice work on Texas UU Justice Ministry (TXUUJM). They have a weekly Action meeting each Thursday listing links to items each of us can take the time to include in our week. I also took part in a training on leading a phone bank team. Texas Children Need Us

Our children need you to <u>act for public education now.</u>

On August 30, the State Board of Education voted to delay revisions to the social studies curriculum until 2025 and shirk their responsi-



bilities. They allowed a fringe minority, who have spread politically motivated falsehoods and misinformation, to pressure them.

Our students deserve better. They deserve an accurate and updated social studies curriculum where they can learn about the experiences of people of color and LGBTQIA+ people, not see those experiences erased.

This Board started the process, and they need to finish the process, not push it off until a new Board is elected.

<u>Tell the SBOE</u>: Texans want our schools to teach the truth.

We can still make sure the SBOE does the right thing by pushing the Board to reconsider their preliminary vote and committing to teaching the truth. In recent months we have seen the far-right movement spread falsehoods about what is happening in our public schools. They do not represent all Texans. It is imperative and urgent that we push for a curriculum that is inclusive of all Texas students and does not whitewash our history.

Tell SBOE members to act on a social studies curriculum that is representative of all Texas students now and join our movement to #TeachTheTruth today.

Money Matters

In July, we had total receipts of \$13,483.00, almost all of which was pledges, most prepaid for the year. Total expenses for the month were \$3,694.09, leaving us with net income for July of \$9,788.91.

As of July 31, 2022, we had \$21,604.45 available in checking, including \$3,663.00 held in trust for Kat Walston. We also have a total of \$19,107.86 in all savings accounts, including \$2,545.00 in the Ronda Decaire Memorial Fund. The total market value of our investment in UUCEF funds was \$67,004.17, reflecting a market value increase of \$219.77 (0.3%) from the value of our original investment (virtually no change).

It is worth noting that following month end, several fairly significant expenditures were made which will show up in the August financial statements:

- \$364.98 for a new printer
- \$476.62 various upgrades to video streaming
- \$710.00 payment of the total balance of our current UUA Fair Share pledge
- \$500.00 payment of our budgeted contribution to Texoma Family Shelter
- \$800.00 labor for AV project and facility maintenance
- \$320.58 purchase of carts for the kitchen
- \$1,174.28 A/C repair

Our Common Read for September

Make "A Warm Welcome" Part of your "New Normal"

The pandemic changed many facets of congregational life, including attendance. In the past two and half years, congregations have learned new dance steps to accommodate COVID-19. Amidst all the masking/not masking and closing/not closing, congregations wondered what happened to their members. Some congregations moved to multi-platform worship and welcomed new faces or faces they had not seen in a while via online technology. Yet most lay leaders, staff, and clergy speak with are uncertain, after all these changes, about their membership

During my time in parish ministry, I observed that people continually came to congregations looking for something; education for their children, pastoral care and connection for themselves About a year into the pandemic congregational consultants in a variety of denominations noted that whatever happened, congregational life would never return to what it had been, that the pandemic would permanently alter facilities, staffing, technology, worship, communities, as well as attendance and membership. Thus far, this seems to be the case. Congregations that never thought it possible to place virtual technology in their historic sanctuaries found a way. And congregations that heavily relied on in-person events found ways to connect in online spaces.

and their families, a place to grieve, a place to search for meaning, a place to be whole, something more. The pandemic changed many things, but not these needs. With the arrival of vaccinations for children, good weather, past years spent adding tents and outdoor options, daily updated CDC data, and lots of masks this could be the fall that we welcome visitors and former members. Will your congregation be ready?

In his article <u>5 Hospitality and Stewardship Lessons from a Homecoming</u>, Reverend Ken Sloane reminds us of the importance of connection. Any time someone enters online or in-person congregational space, there are several opportunities for multiple connection points from which a long-term relationship can continue and grow. Here are some examples:

Recommit to a Community Habit of Greeting

This fall make sure to have welcomers at the door (whether online or in-person doors). Remind congregants to greet people they don't know. If you are a congregant, alternate between greeting an old friend and meeting a new friend.

Ask Open Questions

If in doubt about whether someone is new try saying, "Hello! My names are XX. I am not sure we have met before" (this statement works in online space too). Ask open and honest questions and share a little about yourself such as "What brought you here today? I came for the XX (singing, sermon, chocolate buffet — fill in the blank)." Avoid asking questions that can be experienced as exclusive such as "What do you do for work?" or "Where do you come from?" or "Where did/do you go to college?" See Widening the Welcome for more ways to be inclusive.

Create More Opportunities for Greeting!

If your connection points are in online space with the capacity for personal engagement, try joining the online room early, or staying late. If there is an enabled chat feature say "hello" to people, or message someone you don't know and offer greetings.

Your Attention Is a Gift

When you meet someone new, truly listen to them. In his introduction, <u>Learn to Listen Well</u> Reverend Prince Rivers reminds us of what a rare and powerful gift it is to listen to others. It is a ministry to take an interest in a "stranger," to fully listen, without distraction or interruption. True hospitality involves sincere attention to the thoughts, feelings, and experiences of others.

Help Create Further Connections

Based on your interaction you can discern if this visitor would like to be introduced to other people, leave the online space, or just find the coffee pot. As the minister, I often kept an eye on visitors, and after first introductions, would find an opportunity to circle around before they left to ask if they had any questions, or just thank them for stopping by.

Create coordinated entry points for visitors to get on the congregational mailing list, either by filling out a card, or through a link that can be shared in an online format. If you have the capacity, create entry points that collect visitor interests and questions. If a visitor indicates an interest in religious education, mail a brochure. If they are interested in social justice, send an email with upcoming congregational events where they can engage.

Personal Invitations Make a Difference

Finally, if you have not seen a member in a while, invite them back. According to a <u>One Invitation Away from Returning</u> by Reverend Rebekah Simon-Peter, a significant minority of former members would return if a friend or acquaintance invited them, and an even higher percentage of millennials would considering returning if invited by someone they know.

Our ministry is to share hospitality and welcome at all connection points, spaces, and places. People are hungry for our values and message. Take the time to engage, listen, and grow.
