Search Team Update

The Minister Search Team meets each month at 2 pm in the Alexander Room on the Thursday prior to the Sunday monthly Board meeting. It is an open meeting so join us live or on Zoom with the Zoom ID 989 0789 7878.

At the fall congregational meeting the membership approved funds that we may use to help cover the minister's compensation package. An amount "not to exceed" of \$51,000 was approved. This amount would come from savings. This money will be pulled out in increments to meet the monthly compensation demands as needed. Barring any future surprises, we except that we will not need this full amount.

This month the team also put in place an online form where people may pledge funds to help cover the minister compensation package. I am proud to say that to date we have a total of \$12,840 pledged from 7 people. We won't need this money until the minister starts, but you are welcome to donate it sooner and we will save it in a restricted fund bucket. The Team expects that this number will increase over time. If you are interested in pledging to this fund, click here.

We are now applying for the NTUUC Grant and the Chalice Lighters Grant to complete the funding we need. Once we secure these grants, we will next enter our church profile into the UUA Minister Search Program. After our profile is approved by UUA we can start looking at available ministers and they can look at our profile. Hopefully, we will find a match. However, there are 3 NTUUC churches looking for ministers as well as other UU churches everywhere and the pool of ministers available is not big so it may take a while.

We held our Fall Congregational Meeting amid a very welcome and much needed rain. You can tell that I am a rancher and in touch with the weather because it impacts farmers' and ranchers' livelihood and impacts the food supply in our area. That impacts you, even though you may think that all food arrives from somewhere else fully processed, packaged and ready for your table. But I digress.

For the Fall Congregational Meeting, we had a quorum with 16 persons attending and 8 persons with proxy or on zoom. As I read through the Annual Reports, I was struck by how much is happening at Red River UU.

We are an impressive congregation of active souls. Some of us are busy doing one activity while others are busy doing other activities, but everything is important and contributes to the well-being of our church. Everyone seems to pitch in to do whatever is needed. During the meeting, Marion volunteered to head the Shelter Meals Team that has been inactive.

I was especially impressed with renewed energy in Community Outreach. Many of these listed activities have been done by Amy on her own or were done with very few others. They are Pride, Free Children's Clothing Swap, Art Fest, Austin College Volunteer Opportunity & Internship Fair, National Voter Registration Day, NAACP Dinner, and the Denison Fall Festival. She and those few can't continue to do all of this on their own. It was a lot to get done, and more is needed and that means more of us need to be involved. Please contact Amy to see how you can get involved.

Our area is growing. New people are moving here. This is the perfect moment to make contact and be visible, so newcomers know we are here to provide a

liberal spiritual option. The warmth of our church community should be shared.

I am so pleased that we approved using up to \$51,000 over two years in funds from savings so that the Minister Search Team can apply for NTUUC and other grants to support a contract minister, provided that search is successful. Only two people voted to have no more than \$26,000 taken from savings for the minister compensation fund. I am also encouraged by the number of "In Support of the Minister's Compensation Fund" pledges that have already been made: \$12,860. If you haven't pledged, please do that so they know how much they have to work with.

I distributed HELP cards for everyone to see. These cards provide a list of resources in the area where people can get help. They fold to the size of a business card for handy reference. You gave me good suggestions about the HELP cards and their distribution. There are cards for each of our Oklahoma and Texas local areas. I'm sure these will be helpful to people in our communities.

Money Matters

For the first quarter of the current fiscal year, we had total income of \$17,242.42, which was over budget by \$5,032.42, due to the prepayment of the current year's pledges (total pledges received through the end of the quarter exceeded the budget by \$5,602.50). Total expenses were \$13,177.69 (slightly over budget), leaving an excess of income over expenses of \$4,064.73, for the three months ended September 30, 2022.

Included in Administration expenses – copying, is \$364.98, which was the cost of a new printer. Included in Community expenses – Social Action, is \$280.00 paid to the Ministerial Alliance and \$50.00 paid for Art Fest. Included in Facilities expenses – Building Maintenance, was \$1,174.28 paid for A/C system repairs.

As of September 30, 2022, we had \$15,387.24 available in checking, including \$5,413.00 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. There is a total of \$19,110.27 in all savings accounts, which includes the \$2,545.00 for the Rhonda DeCaire Memorial Fund. There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in in the UUA Common Endowment Fund which has a current market value of \$68,073.07. It is also worth noting that a total of \$1,764.00 of new AV equipment was purchased in this quarter and the \$1,326.00 included in Other Current Assets – Uncategorized Asset, is the prepayment of our entire UUA Fair Share for this year. The funds through this charitable giving function are transferred to the charity after 21 days, so sellers need to be mindful of this when scheduling withdrawals from their PayPal accounts.

FAITHFULLY BECOMING UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY PITTSBURGH • JUNE 21 - 25, 2023

The theme for General Assembly 2023 is "Faithfully Becoming." We continue to live in times of transition and change; so much is in flux. The COVID-19 pandemic upended our lives, our communities, and the world. It made clear the devastating and deadly impacts of longstanding racial and economic disparities. The ongoing losses and threats from climate change (of which the pandemic is not unrelated), growing authoritarian movements and the rolling back of fundamental human rights – these all-present tremendous challenges for our lives, our children, and our future. Many feel worn out and overwhelmed. But times of notable change can also be moments of opportunity and possibility. Major shifts are happening. Our theology and our values as Unitarian Universalists are needed.

This General Assembly will be an exciting moment demonstrating the ways we are called into Faithfully Becoming.

We are at a threshold moment for our faith, and will choose the next path in our journey. We will consider new articulations of Article II (including our Principles and Purpose) and elect a new President to lead our Association. These are decisions that will shape who we are and how we respond to and grow through these times. These changes offer us possibilities for becoming more connected, courageous, inclusive, generous, and continuing our ongoing journey of becoming Beloved Community.

November. Common Read

ur Common Read this month is from the UU World's "<u>Welcome to Unitarian Universalism</u>" column that offers brief answers to some of our newcomers' most frequent questions about UU practices, beliefs, and culture.

How do people become Unitarian Universalist ministers? And didn't I read once that Jared Kushner is an internet Unitarian minister?

He isn't. Unfortunately for everyone, the letter U is a very common letter to start a religion's name with, and that creates a lot of confusion. When you hear about internet ministers, that's generally the Universal Life Church. Not only *are* there no internet UU ministers, there *couldn't* be. Only congregations have the power to ordain ministers—and without a congregation ready to perform the ceremony of ordination, there can be no Unitarian Universalist minister. In fact, this is *technically* the only requirement—but note the italics.

This requirement speaks to our commitment to congregational polity, which is sometimes understood as a fancy term for "congregations make their own decisions." It's more than that, though. Congregational polity is also a fancy term for "we support each other and hold each other accountable." To embody this support and accountability, there is another layer to what makes a minister, called fellowshipping, which basically involves getting approval from the wisdom of the larger group.

Most UU ministers undergo a fellowshipping process prior to ordination that involves psychological testing, much hands-on experience and mentorship, a master's degree, and the reading of a truly intimidating list of texts that can later be used to line their office walls for both decoration and insulation. At the end of this process, the Ministerial Fellowship Committee—which is populated by both clergy and laity—agrees that the candidate is ready to go. And *then* the congregation ordains them. (If they so choose. There is, of course, a vote. There's *always* voting.)

What exactly are the requirements for ordination? Does the minister pledge celibacy, poverty, and obedience, and declare their adherence to a strict creed? As you might imagine, they do none of these things. Matters of celibacy would generally be considered none of the congregation's business (as would matters of gender or sexual orientation). There is no vow of poverty—ministers draw salaries, like other

professionals. And obedience is out of the question, although ministers do have a mutual covenant through which they agree how they will relate to one another. It involves matters of support and mutual accountability, and very much does not involve obedience.

As for adherence to a strict creed, that's not only not a requirement, it's explicitly stated in the Unitarian Universalist Association bylaws that it *cannot* be a requirement.

What happens at an ordination service? Does the bishop lay hands on the new minister? Well, this would be tricky, because there is no UU bishop. There is often a laying on of hands, but it usually involves everyone. There's usually a Charge to the Minister and a Charge to the Congregation (these are marching orders of a sort, given by someone the new minister chooses). There's usually the offering of a collegial blessing such as the right hand of fellowship, where another minister welcomes the new minister into the collegial group. And there's always the act of ordination, which is performed by the members of the congregation and is usually a reading led by the congregational president.

There is no magical moment of ethereal transformation where the minister takes their place as an intermediary between God and humankind. UUs do not all agree on whether there is a God, much less where such a God might be located. But we definitely agree that whatever transcendental forces exist, ministers do not have a special place in controlling or mediating those forces. Ministry is not a supernatural state of any kind. It's a choice, a process, and an ongoing relationship.

One final word to confuse matters a little further. In Unitarian Universalist congregations, ministry is not seen as a thing that only ordained ministers do. Ordained ministry is just one type of ministry. There are music ministries and religious education ministries and community ministries, and sometimes these things are done by ordained ministers and sometimes they are done by laity or other religious professionals. Even preaching at the pulpit—something long associated with ordination—is a shared privilege and responsibility. We believe that the truth is not spoken until many voices—and many types of voices—are heard (and even then, it's still a work in process). UUs will often refer to something someone does in the world as "a ministry," even when it's not being done by a minister. Sometimes, the phrase "ministry" means "important work you're called to do," and we believe *everyone* is called to do important work.

Everyone. No ifs, ands, or buts!
