1. The board has approved a new printer for communications, HVAC cleaning and maintenance, and carts for the kitchen. Amy is labeling the drawers for the carts. This provides a new appearance and more function for the kitchen. Carolyn and Bruce purchased new Corelle dishes that are lighter weight and will fit the dishwasher better. Thank you, Bruce and Carolyn. Amy is selling the other ones on eBay with the proceeds going to the minister search fund. Thanks, Amy.

2. Estimates:

- a. It will cost approximately \$6000 to repair the garage and replace the siding. We are seeking a grant to help with some of that cost, but the board approved the funding so that repairs could begin in a timely fashion.
- b. Marion suggested that we print HELP cards for people who are needing to access community resources, such as food banks and medical help. Marilyn, with Doug's help, designed the cards. The cost of printing them was prohibitive, so we sought another way of printing them that will be more affordable. You will be able to see them at the Fall Meeting.
- 3. Jim gave the Minister Search Team report and reported that a funding shortfall of \$60,000 over two years must be made up before we qualify to find a minister for a two-year term. You will hear more information about this and have an opportunity to vote on this at the Fall Meeting. This team is working hard to make this work for us.
- 4. For our Labor of Love Sunday, we will be working on cleaning, straightening and putting away things that have accumulated in the wrong places and taking care of things that Minnie can't manage during weekly cleaning.

 - 9. The board reviewed progress that has been made on Annual Goals We will review these at the Fall Meeting so we can get your input.
 - 10. Amy opened an eBay account for Red River UU Church. She worked with Jim to open a PayPal account to link to the eBay account. Next, they will establish the church as a charity. Once this process is complete, anyone

Money Matters

In the month of August, we had total receipts of \$1,452.00. Total expenses for the month were \$6,759.02, which included \$1,729.28 for building maintenance (a/c repair), leaving us with a net loss for the month of (\$5,307.02). It is worth noting that in August we paid all of the remaining balance for this fiscal year of our Fair Share donation to UUA, and we paid \$500 to the Texoma Family Shelter in support of their annual fundraiser ' the 42 Bed Bash'. Also, please note that year-to-date we have net income of \$4,481.89, due largely to the prepayment of pledges in July. As of August 31, 2022, we had \$17,270.81 available in checking, including \$5,413.00 held in trust

for Kat Walston. We also have a total of \$19,107.86 in all savings accounts, including \$2,545.00 in the Ronda Decaire Memorial Fund. The total market value of our investment in UU Common Endowment Funds was \$70,077.67, reflecting a market value increase of \$3,293.27 (4.9%) from the value of our original investment.

THE UNRAVELING OF AMERICA

Editor Note: "The Unraveling of America" by anthropologist Professor Wade Davis was the most read of tens of thousands of stories published by Rolling Stone in 2020. The whole article is too long for our newsletter, so I selected random paragraphs that I felt important. The link to the entire article at follows hopefully enough intriguing snippets to whet your desire to read it all.

WADE DAVIS HOLDS the Leadership Chair in Cultures and Ecosystems at Risk at the University of British Columbia. His award-winning books include "Into the Silence" and "The Wayfinders." His new book, "Magdalena: River of Dreams." is published by Knopf.

In a single season, civilization has been brought low by a microscopic parasite 10,000 times smaller than a grain of salt. <u>COVID-19</u> attacks our physical bodies, but also the cultural foundations of our lives.

Unsettling as these transitions and circumstances will be, short of a complete economic collapse, none stands out as a turning point in history. But what surely does is the absolutely devastating impact that the pandemic has had on the reputation and international standing of the United States of America.

At the height of the Covid crisis, with more than 2,000 dying each day, Americans found themselves members of a failed state, ruled by a dysfunctional and incompetent government largely responsible for death rates that added a tragic coda to America's claim to supremacy in the world.

For the first time, the international community felt compelled to send disaster relief to Washington. For more than two centuries, reported the *Irish Times*, "the United States has stirred a very wide range of feelings in the rest of the world: love and hatred, fear and hope, envy and contempt, awe and anger. But there is one emotion that has never been directed towards the U.S. until now: pity." As American doctors and nurses eagerly awaited emergency airlifts of basic supplies from China, the hinge of history opened to the Asian century.

In the wake of the war, with Europe and Japan in ashes, the United States with but 6 percent of the world's population accounted for half of the global economy, including the production of 93 percent of all automobiles. Such economic dominance birthed a vibrant middle class, a trade union movement that allowed a single breadwinner with limited education to own a home and a car, support a family, and send his kids to good schools.

But freedom and affluence came with a price. The United States, virtually a demilitarized nation on the eve of the Second World War, never stood down in the wake of victory. To this day, American troops are deployed in 150 countries. Since the 1970s, China has not once gone to

war; the U.S. has not spent a day at peace.

Since 2001, the U.S. has spent over \$6 trillion on military operations and war, money that might have been invested in the infrastructure of home. China, meanwhile, built its nation, pouring more cement every three years than America did in the entire 20th century.

By the 1960s, 40 percent of marriages were ending in divorce. Only six percent of American homes had grandparents living beneath the same roof as grandchildren.

The republic that defined the free flow of information as the life blood of democracy, today ranks 45th among nations when it comes to press freedom.

U.S. laws define freedom as an individual's inalienable right to own a personal arsenal of weaponry, a natural entitlement that trumps even the safety of children; in the past decade alone 346 American students and teachers have been shot on school grounds.

The measure of wealth in a civilized nation is not the currency accumulated by the lucky few, but rather the strength and resonance of social relations and the bonds of reciprocity that connect all people in common purpose.

This has nothing to do with political ideology, and everything to do with the quality of life. Finns live longer and are less likely to die in childhood or in giving birth than Americans. Danes earn roughly the same after-tax income as Americans, while working 20 percent less. They pay in taxes an extra 19 cents for every dollar earned. But in return they get free health care, free education from pre-school through university, and the opportunity to prosper in a thriving free-market economy with dramatically lower levels of poverty, homelessness, crime, and inequality. The average worker is paid better, treated more respectfully, and rewarded with life insurance, pension plans, maternity leave, and six weeks of paid vacation a year. All of these benefits only inspire Danes to work harder, with fully 80 percent of men and women aged 16 to 64 engaged in the labor force, a figure far higher than that of the United States.

American politicians dismiss the Scandinavian model as creeping socialism. ... That social democracy will never take hold in the United States may well be true, but, if so, it is a stunning indictment, and just what Oscar Wilde had in mind when he quipped that the United States was the only country to go from barbarism to decadence without passing through civilization. Mathematical Cat By Don Mathis




I've a mathematical cat.
