"Ecological Responsibility and the Global Biodiversity Crisis"

The Rev. Dr. Mark Y.A. Davies, leading Sometimes as we rightly focus on the climate crisis, it is easy to forget the global biodiversity crisis (exacerbated and accelerated by the climate crisis) we are now facing. Since 1970, we have lost nearly 70% of animal wildlife populations on the planet, with much of their habitat being lost to animal agriculture.* Ecologists note that our current extinction rate is currently 1,000 to 10,000 times the normal background extinction rate, with 50% of species potentially facing extinction by the end of the 21st Century.** We are experiencing the Sixth Great Extinction on Earth and the only one caused by the activity of one species. It is a moral imperative for us all to address the global biodiversity crisis, but what, realistically, can we do? You may read Mark's bio here.

We held our Spring Congregational Meeting in May and adopted the preliminary budget that was reduced by the finance team to meet our pledged income. Through some very generous last-

minute pledge revisions, we didn't need to cut as deeply as we thought we might need to.

We all appreciate their commitment and service.

We approved the proposed 8th Principle of Section II of the UUA bylaws to be considered at the General Assembly this June: "We covenant to affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse, multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions." The wording doesn't just profess a belief, but calls us to action.

We accepted the reports with few corrections from the Board, Membership, Committee on Ministry, Nominations and Minister Search Team.

We evaluated the goals we had for this fiscal year. Through that process, we adapted and extended some of those goals and added some additional goals. They are listed below for you to remember and put into play as we move through this fiscal year on July 1 st.

- 1. Become more visible in the community through participation in community events and usage of the building for outside organization events.
- 2. Hold one cleanup day and several tidy-up days.

- 3. Continue pursuing funding for the minister compensation fund.
- 4. Increase membership.
- 5. Seek additional members for the team that responds to comments on YouTube, Facebook, Website, Meetup, etc.
- 6. Bring in special speakers and events to the church and advertise them extensively to the wider community to let the community and employees of new businesses know what is happening at RedRiverUU as an effort to introduce them to our liberal, inclusive religion.
- 7. Market the church to the wider community, especially the employees of new businesses.
- 8. Seek a song leader.
- 9. Organize and hold a 3-day summer children's program to be held during 2024 summer.

The Power of NOW program led by Jim Runnels and Chair Yoga led by Marsha Runnels have resulted in some new visitors to RedRiverUU. Some people participating in the clothing swaps led by Adrian Hinman have also expressed interest. So, these programs are a service to our church and to the wider community and they are bringing new people to our doors.

By the way, there is another Kids Clothing Swap in the chapel on Saturday, June 3 rd from 3-8 pm. An outside event "Awaken to Your True Nature" by Gian Girardi, was May 24th and came about through the Power of Now program.

A Juneteenth Jubilee, June 19 th, music and hotdog event on our church lawn has been proposed for 5:00-8:00 pm, but is not yet confirmed. Stay tuned.

Put on your thinking caps and bring your outreach ideas to the board so we can find the people to implement new plans and sign additional special speakers or events.

In other business, Marla made a plea for people to step up and serve on the worship team or as worship associates. They are understaffed and overwhelmed. This is a vital part of our church and must be supported. Please volunteer.

At the board meeting held in early May prior to the Spring Meeting, the board approved contacting American Textile Recycling Service to put a drop off box on our property at no charge for receiving recyclable clothing. Anyone may put clothing they wish to recycle into the box which will be emptied by American Textile Recycling Service on a regular basis. They have cameras to monitor the outside and inside of the clothing bin so they know when to empty the bin.

I volunteered to substitute in Children's RE for David when he has to be absent. I will need to hold the class in the Emerson room, since I can't climb the stairs well. We would appreciate others volunteering to assist occasionally as well. We have a curriculum guide that provides step-by-step lessons and activities and we have support materials for crafts to enhance those lessons. Having a second leaders would make things more enjoyable to everyone.

Money Matters

In the month of April, we had total receipts of \$3,080.08. Total expenses for the month were \$3,363.07, leaving us with a net loss for the month of (\$282.99). The net loss for the month was primarily due to expenses to repair the garage.

Net loss for the fiscal year-to-date was (\$254.38). The year-to-date net loss was due to expenses to repair the garage partly offset by lower expenses than budgeted on many different line items.

As of April 30, 2023, we had \$10,220.12 available in checking. There is a total of \$20,607.17 in all savings accounts, which includes \$4,037.08 for the Minister Compensation Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in the UUA Common Endowment Fund.

A total of \$15,440 has currently been pledged for the minister's compensation fund. Additional pledges can be made by contacting the minister search team.
