As we reflect on our existence as a nation, let us move beyond the hubris of an "America First" mentality and instead ask ourselves what our country can do to contribute to a more beloved community throughout the world. Marilyn Musings

This is my last musing after two years as president. This has been a great adventure and one that has taught me a lot. I want to express my appreciation for the board members who have been instrumental in making our progress. I also want to thank Jim Holmes for his support and guidance and all the other things he helped with. Doug has been invaluable as editor of my musings. The current board members will be continuing and will be working with Jana who is our incoming president. I appreciate Jana for agreeing to take this position. I began as NTUUC Rep. and will continue in that position.

During these two years as a church, we have moved beyond the pandemic's stifling shutdown. The Policy and Procedures Manual has been revised. New nametags have been designed. The kitchen has been reorganized with carts for ease of use. The garages have been repaired and sided. New outreach programs have been instituted and some like the Spiritual Book Club, Rainbow Committee activities, and Free Clothing Swaps are continuing. Conversation & Calories and potluck dinners have been made available again. HELP cards for Texas and Oklahoma have been distributed to assist people with finding essential aide services. Items in the garages and basement were inventoried and items that were not needed were sold. The 8th Principle was approved for our church. We joined the Sherman and Denison Chambers of Commerce. We held an open house and ribbon cutting to introduce us to the Denison community. We became active with the Texas UU Justice Ministry. We placed an ad in the Recycling Guide that is given to all new water customers in Sherman. As we have done for 15 years, we produced the Earth Day festival. We established a Minister Search Team. We received a large grant from NTUUC for minister compensation. We evaluated current goals and revised and proposed new goals each year. We added members. All of this and more was accomplished while still maintaining a balanced budget and supporting the activities of our church, holding exceptional worship services, and maintaining our site.

At Red River UU we continue to make concerted progress! On May 12th, we held our first choir practice and selected music to sing. We aren't ready to perform yet but are hopeful that we can get it ready along with other songs to sing for you soon. I was

encouraged by the singing during the Morning Assembly prior to the Spring Congregational Meeting. Let's keep it up, sing out and make a joyful noise!

Prior to the Spring Meeting, we had a wonderful array of delicious potluck items to delight our eyes and warm our bellies. I thank all of you who brought your finest recipes.

During the Spring Congregational Meeting, we had rousing discussions concerning the following.

- Current outreach efforts and progress on several fronts to grow membership were reviewed.
- What are our options moving forward if we don't find a suitable and affordable minister?
- If we do find a minister, then what is our status when the 2-year contract ends?
- How can we increase outreach to grow membership?
- Could we use the extra funds to hire a PR/Marketing Consultant to increase our visibility in the community?

The proposed vision statement was discussed, amended, and approved. It reads:

"To create a beloved community that is spiritually alive, joyfully inclusive, and justice centered."

Current goals were discussed, some removed, others revised, and new goals were added for the new fiscal year. We were directed to make the goals sustainable, achievable, and measurable.

The following goals were approved for 2024-2025.

- 1. Expand increasing visibility online and at large.
- 2. Bring in three outside speakers for programs that are not a part of the Morning Assembly.
- 3. Hire a music leader.
- 4. Maintain current membership and increase new membership by 8 or more.
- 5. Continue work toward hiring a contract minister.
- 6. Seek two outside groups to meet in our building and pay rent.

The nominations from the Nomination Committee were approved.

Money Matters

Treasurer Report as of April 30, 2024

In the month of April, we had total receipts of \$4,899.39. Total expenses for the month were \$3,521.07, leaving us with a net profit for the month of \$1,378.32. The net profit for April was due to the prepayment of some pledges for next year, partly offset by an additional donation to the Earth Day Festival.

We had a net profit for the fiscal year-to-date of \$9,321.90. The year-to-date net profit was primarily due to higher other income and the prepayment of some pledges for next year. We also had lower worship expenses, lower costs for copying and supplies, and lower costs for the church app. These savings were partly offset by costs to improve building security and an additional donation to the Earth Day Festival.

As of April 30, 2024, we had \$19,381.99 available in checking. There is a total of \$20,752.52 in the bank savings account, including \$4,871.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the Savings Fund for minister compensation.

Mirister Search

We had a very lively and constructive discussion about the minister search at our Spring Congregation meeting on May 19th. The main concern in getting a 2-year contract minister is the overall cost of the compensation package that will be Red River's share. The congregation voted in a prior meeting to allocate up to \$51,000 from available savings to help cover the compensation cost. Should we spend all those funds we would be left with around \$10,000 remaining in available funds. This estimate is based on our current financial position and the UUA recommended compensation package that grows 3% per year to cover inflation.

Some members voiced their concerns that we cannot get in a bidding war with wealthier UU churches for an experienced minister. One of our major goals in getting a minister is to have them improve our community outreach to help increase our visibility in the Texoma community and thus help


us bring in more members, especially younger members with families. If we decide to settle for a minister with less experience in outreach, we may end up at the end of two years with not reaching our outreach goals and with truly little money left in available funds.

It was asked if we could maybe divert our minister funds to hiring a PR firm and spending more on outreach. Unfortunately, the NTUUC grant is only available to use for minister compensation. We have around \$5,100 in savings that have been reserved for the minister. compensation. We have around \$5,100 in savings that have been reserved for the minister. That money can be redirected by the Board. We have an additional \$15,400 in pledge commitments toward the minister compensation. The people who made those pledges would need to be contacted to see if they would change their pledge use to outreach projects. The \$51,000 in savings is only available for the minister compensation. We would need another membership vote to reallocate all or part of it for other expenses. Of course, we would need to produce well-defined outreach programs (new or existing) before we decide to proceed down this path.

Meanwhile, we still have our open request for minister on the UUA Minister portal. We do not expect any activity on this until next fall. We do have a contact at Brice Divinity We do have a contact at Brice Divinity (TCU divinity school). We plan on contacting them to see if they have any candidates that might be interested in our position.

Our Ul Frond Fride Work!

June is PRIDE month. We kick things off by sharing a snapshot of the Unitarian Universalist Association's work on equality which started over a half century ago.

- In 1969 the first UU minister came out as homosexual on the national scene: Rev. James L. Stoll. He never served in a congregation again. Prior to that, ministers discovered to be gay were fired from their congregations (though once one was rehired as a custodian).
- In 1970 The first General Assembly resolution on this topic passed urging the UUA to work to end discrimination against homosexuals and bisexuals.
- In 1971 Unitarian Universalism began teaching about gay issues to youth the UU curriculum About Your Sexuality (now called Our Whole Lives).
- In 1979 the first out gay men in the UU ministry were called to serve congregations: Rev. Douglas Morgan Strong, called to All Souls Church, Augusta, ME, and Rev. Mark Belletini, called to First UU Society of San Francisco, CA.
- In 1980, a General Assembly resolution urged the UUA to end discrimination against lesbian, gay, and bisexual people regarding employment, and assist in the settlement of lesbian, gay, and bisexual religious leaders.
- In 1984, a General Assembly resolution affirmed the practice of conducting services of union for gay and lesbian couples.
- In 1989, a General Assembly resolution urged the UUA to implement the Welcoming Congregation program (proposed by the Common Vision Planning Committee and approved by the UUA Board of Trustees), and the first edition of the curriculum was published in 1990.
- in 1988 the first openly transgender person was ordained.
- The UUA has been ordaining people regardless of sexual orientation since the 1970s.
- In 2002, the first openly transgender person in the UU ministry was called to serve a congregation: Rev. Sean Dennison, called to South Valley UU Society, Salt Lake City, UT.

- In 2003 Massachusetts was the first U.S. state to legalize same-gender marriage without the decision being overturned. The first same-gender couple to get a marriage license in MA, in May 2004, was a UU couple and it was issued by the UU city clerk.
- In 2009 Standing on the Side of Love was launched, a public advocacy campaign that seeks to harness love's power to stop oppression. The campaign provides a platform for freedom to marry efforts, among other causes.
- The UUA has received more publicity on its work for freedom to marry than any other issue.

Superman Day is June 12. Who is your favorite superhero? And why? Superman Was My Teacher by Don Mathis

When I was a kid, I learned a lot from Superman.

From the television series, Adventures of Superman (1952-1958), I learned honesty. George Reeves' character battled thieves and gangsters. Truth and justice were virtues of Superman and I strived for the same ethics.

I learned courage. Superman was not afraid of anything, and I wanted to be like him.

Especially the flying part. I was not the only kid to leap off a garage roof with a towel around his neck.

When it was announced in 1959 that George Reeves committed suicide, I learned reality. I learned that people are vulnerable, that even the strongest have their weaknesses.

Then I learned how to read. With the TV show off the air, I continued my interest by following Superman comic books or Action Comics. I learned about maturity by reading about Superboy.

And by reading comic books, I learned value. I could find five empty soda-pop bottles worth two cents each. This was enough for the latest issue which sold for a dime.

Inflation was another lesson. When comic prices went to fifteen cents, bottle deposits rose to three cents. It still took five bottles to purchase one comic.

I learned about identity and about accepting other nationalities and cultures. On the planet Krypton, Superman was known as Kal-El. But because he always used his powers for the benefit of humanity, he was not considered an alien.

Superman's secret identity was Clark Kent. Clark was a mild-mannered journalist.

Sometimes people didn't treat him with respect but that didn't bother him. He knew his strengths. Maybe my decision to become a writer was because of Clark Kent.

Superman taught me the value of teamwork as well. If faced with a super-villain, Superman might join forces with Batman. If there was an organization of evil, Superman would call his friends from the Justice League of America.

Sometimes, it's easier to share a task. But it's always important to surround yourself with people who use their powers for good.

Superman doesn't harm anyone. I try not to either. He doesn't lie. I try to be honest. He is not possessive. I'm still learning this part. Superman is not obsessed with grudges from his past. I've learned to let go of negative feelings too.
