#### Merrilee Alexander Kick Donates \$50,000

One Sunday about a month or more ago, Merrilee called me and asked how things were going. I said it was a rough Sunday. We found termites in the basement, had a roof leak and the AC wouldn't work in the chapel. My normal fix for the Ac condenser was to replace the Buss Fuses, but that didn't work.

She said, "Oh dear, send me an estimate of what it will cost to fix the things that need fixing." We had let a lot of things go as we prioritized work that had to be done, with little funding. I asked Jim to put together a list and get estimates.

The repairs totaled: \$22.420, and I didn't know how much she would be willing to help with.

Termites: \$8062

Remove stuff in basement over rotted wood flooring, remove wood flooring, remove sheetrock on outer walls

and ceiling. \$1000 Termite removal. \$4773

Termite maintenance fee. \$723

Materials for basement floor. \$566

Roof: \$6700

Cover the back door with a metal roof and posts. \$600 Cover back door with porch, labor. \$1000 Repair leak above front porch. \$200

Remove old shingles on back porch roof. \$2100

Clean the back porch and install new rolled roofing.

\$1000

Move AC Units from roof to small  $2^{nd}$  floor back porch. \$1500

Repair ceiling in kitchen caused by leak. \$300

Front Porch: \$1000

Correct uneven tripping hazard Quote for Misc Needed Work: \$5052

Finish basement brick work

Repair grout on foundation walls inside and out

Clean gutters

Repair front steps

Paint railings

Fix kitchen counter near sink

Replace broken boards on back steps

Clean back porch and put down new cover

Materials

4 bags of grout. \$40 Box of plaster. \$12

Paint. \$300

Kitchen repair: \$1606

Install subfloor and wood vinyl. \$1106

Raise counters or lower carts so they will fit after flooring install. \$500

She looked over the estimate and said that everything seemed reasonable, but she wanted some way to beef up our music and that there was a Bluetooth player piano that might help, but they were fairly expensive. I said that if she was going to add that much that our current keyboard would probably do what she wanted and that we really need to renovate the kitchen, since it was the least attractive room in the building. She said OKAY, but she wanted naming rights. She wanted my name on something. Jim came up with Marilyn's Mess Hall and the name stuck.

She was very generous, sending us a check for \$50,000 and with that, we were able to do everything as requested, plus actually pour concrete into the basement instead of installing gravel. We were able to get a new keyboard that had Bluetooth, and we can sell or trade in the other one. And we were able to get a new computer that was badly needed for the AV area, in addition to renovating the kitchen!

We had a great team working today to remove everything from the kitchen and put it in the Emerson Room. It only took 30 minutes after today's Morning Assembly.

Now the ceiling can be repaired, the plywood walls removed, new electrical service for a 240-v range, new tongue and groove flooring, insulation and sheetrock walls, new lighting, new bottom cabinets, and sink and faucet installed. The plumbing will need to be moved so the dishwashers and sink can be positioned more to the south. New counter tops will be installed. The sheetrock will be finished and painted. There will be no upper cabinets. We probably won't need them. We envision most everything being either in drawers or on the corner carousels.

Everyone who works in the kitchen is really excited about what this transformation will mean for us.

Thank you, Merrilee, you are a wonderful daughter and friend to Red River.

# Money Matters

We started a new fiscal year on July 1. Thanks to everyone for your pledges.

The new year started with a very generous donation of \$50,000 from Marilyn Alexander's daughter, Merrilee Kick. In July, \$15,008.79 was spent on repairs and renovations. That leaves \$34,991.21 remaining in this fund as of July 31.

In the month of July, we had total operating receipts of \$7,680.50. Total operating expenses for the month were \$7,013.74, leaving us with a net profit for the month of \$666.76. The net profit for the month was primarily due to the timing of pledge payments, partly offset by the annual UUA Program Fund expense.

As of July 31, 2024, we had \$16,428.52 available in checking for general operations. There is a total of \$20,755.10 in the bank savings account, including \$4,871.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. There is a total of \$66,784.40 invested in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation.

Aesthetic Team Update



Due to a generous gift from Merrilee Alexander Kick, our church home is receiving some needed updates. Part of the gift was directed towards termite treatment and repairs in the basement needed due to termite damage. Part of the gift was directed towards remodeling the kitchen. The

gift is in the name of Marilyn Alexander, and Merrilee requested naming rights for the kitchen.

The Aesthetics Team has been working with Marilyn Alexander and Jim Holmes (facilities chair) to select materials and design the layout. Work on the basement and treatment for termites are largely completed. Work on the kitchen will begin Monday, September 2.

The entire kitchen will be gutted, including removal of the wooden walls. They will be replaced with fire resistant Sheetrock walls. The existing flooring will be covered with cement board and luxury vinyl plank flooring to prevent damage from potential leaks. The new lower cabinets will be mostly drawers, with a couple of narrow full height cabinets for storage of trays and cookie sheets and a tall pantry cabinet for storage of all our tablecloths and cloth napkins. We chose cabinets with solid plywood boxes and hardwood fronts. The countertops will be solid quartz. We will eliminate most of the open wall shelves since we should easily be able to fit most of our kitchen items inside the many drawers. We are creating a new labeling system to make it easier to keep the kitchen organized. The project is expected to take 2 weeks to complete, and we hope to resume use of the kitchen by the 3rd Sunday of the month.

Facilities Report

Starting September 2, we will be remodeling the kitchen. It should be finished by September 14. The Emerson room will be used to store materials that are needed plus the dishes and other items that we need to remove from the kitchen before work. If you use the Emerson room for meeting, please move your meeting to the Alexander room.

# From our non-resident poet

Labor Day: In Praise of Workers by Don Mathis

The need for unions is still evident as we reflect on Labor Day

Many small businesses are forced out of the competition by large businesses. Corporate officers fatten their salaries at the expense of employees on the bottom rung. Job scarcity makes it hard to switch employers so management can refuse to offer amenities beyond a subsistence level.

Samuel Gompers worked to change these injustices. Born in 1850, Gompers went from a factory worker to become the first president of the American Federation of Labor. His quest for workers to receive higher wages, shorter hours, and collective bargaining was cut short by illness. He died in San Antonio 100 years ago after attending the inauguration of Mexican President Plutarco Elias Calles.

A statue of Gompers (below) on Market Street in San Antonio was erected in 1982 for the AFL-CIO convention. Sculptor Bette Jean Alden portrayed Gompers with a contract in his hand to symbolize the beneficial agreements that can come between capital and labor.



The pedestal of the statue had a plaque which read:

"What does labor want? We want more school houses and less jails. More books and less guns. More learning and less vice. More leisure and less greed. More justice and less revenge. We want more... opportunities to cultivate our better nature." —Samuel Gompers.

These are words to remember on Labor Day.
