I have the distinct pleasure of introducing our Bruce Cameron Distinguished Service Award recipient for 2025.

This person moved here with her husband from Whidby Island, Washington state, to be closer to their son's family. I knew when I met Paula that she was energetic and enthusiastic. Almost immediately, she asked if she could be on one of the teams to bring food for Conversation and Calories. OF COURSE you can, it was my response, and I got her signed up.

Shortly after that Sunday, she somewhat hesitantly, asked me about the maintenance of the grounds. She said that she really likes doing that kind of work and wondered if I needed help. YES, I DID! Since Kerry had to guit doing it, I found it difficult to find reliable people to just mow and trim the yard, much less maintain the flower beds! We discussed what all was involved in the grounds maintenance and she said that her husband would be working with her. I asked how much they would need to be paid for doing the work. She said that they would do it without being paid and that would be a contribution they could make as part of their pledge. Since we had been using my equipment to do the work and now, they were going to take care of it, I quickly bought equipment that they could store in the garage and have ready for use instead of hauling mine back and forth. She was excited about the butterfly gardens, so she works with Linn Cates to make sure that the butterfly gardens are planted and maintained.

Our grounds have never looked better! She and Larry volunteered to repair the inside entrance floor near the back door, where the flooring had become weak or totally deteriorated.

Later she said that she wanted to work on the membership committee. Then, when Carolyn passed away and David had the Caring Committee by himself, she volunteered to help. Here is the kind of help offered. When Megan had back surgery and <u>also</u> broke her arm, Paula and Larry found a way to get lumber to Megan's in Ponder, Texas, to build a ramp so she could get into the 5th wheel trailer that she is living in. She also arranged for Red River members to provide frozen homemade meals, and they were delivered to Megan.

She participates in Rainbow team events and other Red River social justice events. She also has attended and helped provide food for a Chamber of Commerce breakfast provided by Red River. I am delighted that we are recognizing Paula Jennings as our 2025 recipient of the Bruce Cameron Distinguished Service Award.

The new fiscal year started in July 2024 with a very generous donation of \$50,000 from Marilyn Alexander's daughter, Merrilee Kick. An additional \$10,361.00 was donated in October 2024. A total of \$56,467.82 has been spent on repairs and renovations. That leaves \$3,893.18 remaining in this fund as of January 31.

In the month of January, we had total operating receipts of \$2,717.00. Total operating expenses for the month were \$3,721.53, leaving us with a net loss for the month of (\$1,004.53). The net loss for the month was due to the timing of pledge payments and the timing of insurance costs.

For the fiscal year-to-date we had an operating net profit of \$301.39. The year-to date net profit was primarily due to the timing of communication and worship expenses, partially offset by lower weekly offerings.

As of January 31, 2025, we had \$19,951.11 available in checking for general operations. There was also \$9,937.35 available in the bank savings account for general operations plus \$4,871.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston from the sale of her personal effects prior to moving into assisted living. In addition, we have invested a total of \$66,784.40 in the UUA Common Endowment Fund. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the UUA Savings Fund

Texoma Earth Day Festival returns with expanded recycling and entertainment programs. The 2025 Earth Day Festival, Texoma's premier environmental awareness event, will return on April 26 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. with an expanded lineup of workshops, entertainment, and recycling opportunities. Vendors and non-profit organizations can save \$15 on registration fees by registering before March 1, with final registration remaining open through April 16 for businesses and organizations interested in participating in this community celebration.

"This year's festival shows our community practical ways to reduce waste," said Amy Hoffman-Shehan, Earth Day Festival coordinator. "From turning landfill gases into electricity to transforming discarded materials into useful products, we're showcasing innovative solutions that benefit our whole community. The festival will feature educational workshops including beekeeping Continued on next page

demonstrations, fossil exploration with Bluestem Master Naturalists,

and a presentation by Vitol Biomethane about the Texoma Area Solid Waste Authority's (TASWA) innovative landfill-to-energy project that converts waste methane into electricity. Additional workshops include sessions on upcycling.

A comprehensive recycling program will accept materials ranging from electronics and textiles to eyeglasses and {continued on next page}

unused medications, providing residents with a one-stop opportunity to responsibly dispose of various items.

Entertainment will include performances by Legend Martial Arts and various local artists. The festival will also host the Trashion Fashion Show presented by Grayson College, where students transform recycled materials into wearable clothing and costumes, demonstrating creative approaches to repurpose everyday items.
