WORSHIP TEAM MEETING

Our faithful worship team is meeting on Wednesday, July 2 @ 6:30 via Zoom. The team will be reviewing those questionnaires that those who attending the Spring Congregational Meeting completed. Since worship is the most important part of the life of any religious institution, the team will be reaching out to those who volunteered to be an independent scout looking for ways to enrich our Sunday Morning Assemblies.

During the meeting there will be a review of the questionnaire completed by those who attended the May congregational meeting. The results may well change what we do on Sundays. If you want to be part of creating worship, you will find attending this month's Worship Team meeting an effective way to learn more about keeping what we do on Sundays inviting, challenging,

MONEY MATTERS

In the month of May, we had total operating receipts of \$2,339.93. Total operating expenses for the month were \$3,547.13, leaving us with a net loss for the month of (\$1,207.20). The net loss for the month was primarily due to the timing of pledge payments.

For the fiscal year-to-date we had an operating net profit of \$4,247.54. The year-to-date net profit was primarily due to lower grounds maintenance, worship, and communication expenses.

Marilyn Alexander's daughter, Merrilee Kick, donated \$60,361.00 this year to cover repairs and renovations. A total of \$58,170.07 has been spent. That leaves \$2,190.93 remaining in this fund as of May 31.

As of May 31, 2025, we had \$19,999.59 available in checking for general operations. There was also \$9,941.84 available in the bank savings account plus \$4,871.08 restricted for the Minister Fund and \$5,951.89 held in trust for Kat Walston. In addition, we invested a total of \$66,784.40 in the UUA Common Endowment Fund in 2020, which has increased in value. The congregation voted to use up to \$51,000.00 of the UUA Savings Fund for minister compensation. Carole Harner, *treasurer*

THE HISTORY OF WATER COMMUNION

In 1980, two Unitarian Universalist women—Carolyn McDade and Lucile Schuck Longview—were asked to create a worship service for the Women and Religion Continental Convocation of Unitarian Universalists.

As they shaped that service, McDade, and Longview wanted to create a new ritual "that spoke to our connectedness to one another, to the totality of life, and to our place on this planet." They included a new, inclusive symbol of women's spirituality: water.

They write, "Water is more than simply a metaphor. It is elemental and primary, calling forth feelings of awe and reverence. Acknowledging that the ocean is considered by many to be the place from which all life on our planet came—it is the womb of life—and that amniotic waters surround each of us prenatally, we now realize that [this worship service] was for us a new story of creation... We choose water as our symbol of our empowerment."

The November service, held in East Lansing, Michigan, was called "Coming Home Like Rivers to the Sea." As its creators, McDade and Longview enacted their ritual in the liberating space of a semicircle around a large earthenware bowl. They asked eight different women—each coming from distant places—to bring water, and they did: water from the Rio Grande and Assiniboine Rivers, rainwater from Maryland, water from the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, and others were poured into the earthenware bowl as each bearer described its significance.

"As the ritual is continued," says Carolyn McDade, "water deepens in meaning for us, just as water deepens during its long and winding journey to the sea."

hands, doing needlework—it all helps me to drown out The Pest and pay attention.

On the Sunday we had the Awards Luncheon, the tables were set up before worship, and I ended up sitting in the back row. During worship, I saw people engaged in various activities such as playing with their phones, drawing, coloring, and taking notes. I realized that they were like me! These were my people! Some prefer to call neurodivergent neurospicy, and I quite like that.

I learned that some congregations have baskets of fidget toys by the entry into the sanctuary to help those who need to keep their hands busy. I just googled Fidget Toys. It led me to a topic on ADHD (attention deficit hyperactivity disorder) stimming that said rubbing one's hands together can be a way to improve focus and attention. I have been doing this stuff right!

If you think people are ignoring our worship by drawing, playing with their phone, etc. instead, you have it backwards. They are doing those things so they can pay attention and follow things. If you have been worried about what other people would think if you soothed your neurospiciness, you are in a safe place here.

If you have any questions, I'll try to find answers. And if you know anything about Albania, I'd like to hear from you.

Recommended Summer Reading — Don Mathis

As a little boy, I went to Bible class at least twice a week and learned from the stories I heard. Daniel was not afraid in the lions' den. Noah stood up against his neighbors. Moses led his people in the wilderness for 40 years. The Old Testament is overflowing with characters who triumph over adversity.

As a young teen, I devoured the books by Mark Twain. The importance of a sense of humor is manifested in my favorite characters. I wanted the independence and adventures of Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn.

A few years later, I sought that freedom. Just before I set out on the road, I read "On the Road." Jack Kerouac gave me a unique viewpoint to appreciate the experiences and sights I would see hitchhiking to Colorado, Washington, California, and back to Texas.

A generation later I read "Man's Search for Meaning." Viktor Frankl distills from his Holocaust experience the importance of purposeful work, love, and courage in the face of difficulty.

These books taught me to be my own individual and to follow my moral compass. Regardless of the status quo or public opinion, I strive to choose my own attitude, to be my own man.
